Chancey Buttars is the Materials Manager for Franklin County Medical Center, but his work does not end there. He also chairs The Hospital Cooperative's Materials Management Group, where he helps other area facilities find the supplies they need to do their important jobs.

Cynthia Bunde is a Physician Assistant who started volunteering at the Pocatello Free Clinic in the mid-1990s, before she had even decided she wanted to provide medical treatment as a career. Since then, her focus has been on the underserved and low-income populations in the region, including those from rural areas.

Her experience is in psychiatry, OB/GYN and family practice. While working in a clinic or hospital would be more lucrative for Cindy, her heart has always been with serving those who need help the most. She also volunteers to read with children, raise money for homeless programs, and rake leaves for the elderly.

Cynthia is also a clinical assistant professor at Idaho State University in the Physician Assistant Program.

Lance Hansen, Bear Lake Family Medicine & OB/GYN

Lance Hansen is a Family Physician at Bear Lake Family Medicine and OB/GYN in Montpelier, Idaho. He grew up on a potato farm near Blackfoot and attended medical school in Idaho through the Idaho WWAMI/University of Washington School of Medicine.

With a passion for rural medicine, he provides full-scope family medicine, including c-sections and ICU care at Bear Lake Memorial Hospital, where he also serves as Chief of Staff.

He is active in training the next generation of rural family physicians, teaching and mentoring medical students, and leading the admissions committee for Idaho WWAMI.

Dr. Hansen is an Idaho gem. A proud husband and father, community leader and healthcare advocate, his life's work has made a huge impact on the health and lives of many Idahoans.

Russell Spearman, ISU Institute of Rural Health

Russell Spearman is a Senior Research Associate at the ISU Institute of Rural Health in Meridian. He has been dedicated to the prevention and treatment of traumatic brain injuries throughout Idaho for more than 20 years.

His focus has been on priority populations, such as rural, veteran, aging, those experiencing housing instability or domestic violence, athletes, and the uninsured or underinsured. In 2013, Russ received the Federal Traumatic Brain Injury Program Award from HRSA for his work with TBI survivors and their families.

Russ collaborates with statewide coalitions and partners, and consistently involves junior faculty and students in his work, creating many opportunities for others in this area.

A graduate of ISU's School of Nursing's Doctor of Nursing Practice/Family Nurse Practitioner program, she has been instrumental in developing this innovative "retail clinic." A long-time and trusted member of the community she serves, Dr. Woolstenhulme is helping to fill the statewide shortage of primary care clinicians providing care in rural communities.

She is passionate about her work and determined to make a difference in our healthcare system while advocating for all people who need care.
