The Idaho Rural Health Association would like to welcome Board Member, Katrina Hoff



Katrina Hoff joined Jannus, Inc. in September 2015 as the director of the Idaho Area Health Education Center (AHEC) and Covering Idaho Kids, a program devoted to helping eligible families enroll their children in Medicaid or CHIP. Currently, her sole focus is on AHEC, allowing her to fully embrace her passion for working to enhance Idaho's health professions workforce and improving access to care for all Idahoans. Idaho AHEC's mission is to connect students to careers, professionals to communities, and communities to better health. Prior to joining Jannus, Katrina served as the Outreach and Education Director for Idaho Primary Care Association (IPCA), coordinating the efforts of 55 certified state insurance marketplace enrollment counselors located at Federally Qualified Health Centers throughout the state during the startup year of Idaho's health insurance marketplace, Your Health Idaho. While at IPCA, she also served as Director of Workforce Development for nine years, a role that focused on providing health profession recruitment and retention technical assistance to Idaho's Federally Qualified Health Centers. Katrina also served as Director of the Idaho SEARCH program from 2004 - 2012, coordinating statewide rotation placements for health professions students seeking rural rotation opportunities in partnerships with academic institutions, health care providers, and students. She served as a National Health Service Corps Ambassador from 2006 - 2013. Katrina currently serves on the State of Idaho Small Employer Reinsurance Program and Individual High Risk Pool Board of Directors, as well as grant review boards for Idaho's Rural Physician Incentive Program, Rural Health Care Access Program, and State Loan Repayment Program. She was invited to participate in the Idaho State Health Innovation Plan Community Health Worker and Family Caregiver workshops, served on Governor Otter's Healthcare Workforce Planning Committee, and are a member of the Idaho Oral Health Network. Katrina spends her free time co-parenting her grandchildren ages 3, 2, and 7 months.

The Idaho Rural Health Association would like to welcome Board Member, Neil Pilland, PhD



Neill F. Pilland, Dr. P.H. is Research Professor and Director at the Idaho State University Institute of Rural Health. Prior to coming to ISU in 2002 he was Director of the Medical Group Management Association (MGMA) Center for Research for six years and Director of New Mexico's Lovelace Institute for Health and Population Research for thirteen years. A Health Economist and Health Services Researcher, he received his Doctorate in Health Services Administration from UCLA and also holds Masters Degrees in Public Health and in Economics from UCLA and UC Davis respectively. He has been Principal Investigator for more than thirty-five major research and demonstration projects including evaluation of the quality of care in Arizona's Medicaid managed care experiment (AHCCCS); the \$4.3 million New Mexico project for the Community Intervention Trial for Smoking Cessation (COMMIT) and; a national study of Physician Profiling funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. He conducted a large HRSA/ASPR funded program to prepare Idaho's health care workforce for bioterrorism and disaster events through the application of innovative distance learning delivery systems. He has authored or coauthored more than one hundred articles, four books and numerous book chapters on health care delivery, health promotion and health care financing. He is currently directing economic analysis to evaluate the cost-effectiveness of a HRSA funded psychiatric telemedicine delivery system demonstration. He is also Principal Investigator for an evaluation study of patterns of care for hypertension and diabetes in Idaho. He directed two recent feasibility studies for the Shoshone and Bannock Tribes of Idaho: one for a comprehensive health promotion center and another for an integrated long-term care program. He has served on the Board of Directors of the Shoshone and Bannock Tribes Wellness Center since 2009. He is a founding member (2005) of the Northwest Regional Telehealth Resource Center and continues to serve on that Board of Directors. He also served six years as a Trustee and an additional two as an Advisor for the Veterans Medical Research Foundation (VMRF) at the San Diego Veterans Administration Medical Center.

ORIENTATION TO HEALTH CAREERS

provides middle-school and high-school students with a chance to learn more about a variety of health careers in their own communities.

Participants gain awareness about health career options, which we hope increases their desire and motivation to enter primary care or public health occupations.

Critical Access Hospitals, Community Health Centers, Rural Health Clinics, HOSA chapters and other organizations are eligible to apply. OHC is free for student participants and a base stipend of \$1,300 is available to the community host to offset expenses.

Past host communities include Bingham Memorial Hospital, Malad HOSA, Weiser Memorial Hospital, Hacker Middle School, Farmway Village, Snake River HOSA, Clearwater Valley Hospital, and Adams County Health Center.

Orientation to Health Careers is facilitated by Idaho AHEC and funded by the Bureau of Rural Health and Primary Care.
